

Your intake summary

Thank you for talking with us, Amara. This is a copy of what you shared, so you have it for your own records. We've sent the same information to a caseworker at the centre, who will read it and get in touch with you.

You don't need to do anything technical with this — it's just so you can see what was noted, and tell us if anything looks wrong.

What you told us

- You left Nigeria after a protest, when the authorities came to your home and detained and beat your brother.
- You escaped through a neighbour's house and travelled to the UK, arriving about six weeks ago.
- You have a Home Office interview in about three weeks, and you don't yet have a lawyer.
- You were a member of an opposition party.
- You have visible injuries, and a doctor has examined you and written a letter about them.
- You have had no contact with anyone back home, because you are afraid for their safety and your own.

What you shared with us

- Your Home Office screening interview record
- A photo from the protest
- Your GP's medico-legal letter

What happens next

1. A caseworker at the centre will read everything you shared.
2. They will contact you to arrange a first meeting. Because your interview is close, they will treat this as urgent.
3. At that meeting they will go through your account in detail and explain your options.

Before your meeting, if you can

- Keep your phone safe — the protest photo and the date saved with it may be important.
- Bring your ARC card and any letters from the Home Office.
- Don't worry if you can't find everything. Just bring what you have.

A note on the date. You mentioned the protest was on 16 March. One of your documents records 14 March. This is a small thing and very common — the caseworker will simply check it with you. It is nothing to worry about.

You are not alone in this. The centre has your information and will be in touch soon.

This summary is for you. It is a record of your intake, not legal advice. The personal details in the version sent to the caseworker are handled securely. If anything here is wrong, reply to the centre and we'll correct it.
